1 . Main points

- Of the estimated 21.1 million households (where at least one member is aged 16 to 64 years) in the UK, 58.0% had all household members aged 16 years and over in employment during April to June 2021, down 0.9 percentage points compared with the same period last year.
- There was an estimated 27.9% of households with a mix of at least one working and one workless adult, up 0.4 percentage points compared with the same period last year.
- There was an estimated 14.1% of households where no member of the household was in employment, up 0.4 percentage points compared with the same period last year.

Labour Force Survey (LFS) responses have been [reweighted to new populations](#) derived using growth rates from HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) Real Time Information (RTI, to allow for different trends during the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The reweighting will give improved estimates of both rates and levels.

3 . Measuring the data

Labour force survey household datasets are used for analysis of family or household characteristics. For all analysis in this bulletin a household is defined as containing at least one person aged 16 to 64 years. This bulletin focuses on the economic status of household members. For example:

- number of people in employment in the household
- number of people unemployed in the household
- number of people economically inactive in the household

All estimates in this release are not seasonally adjusted and all comparisons should be carried out on an annual basis (for example, by comparing April to June periods with April to June periods, or October to December periods with October to December periods). Comparisons made in the datasets associated with this release are between the latest available period, April to June 2021, and April to June 2020.
