1. Main points

- In late March 2024, more than half (52%) of businesses reported that they were not concerned about the impact climate change may have on their business, up 10 percentage points from early February 2023 (42%).
- In late March 2024, 50% of businesses reported taking at least some level of action to reduce their carbon emissions, a rise of 4 percentage points from early November 2023; the most reported action taken was switching to light emitting diode (LED) bulbs (30%).
- Approximately one in seven (14%) businesses reported that they are currently using some form of artificial intelligence technology, an increase from 10% in late December 2023; for businesses with 250 or more employees, this percentage was higher at 24%, a rise of 5 percentage points over the same period.
- Approximately 1 in 10 (10%) businesses expect their capital expenditure to increase between April and June 2024; this is broadly stable with expectations for between January and March 2024.

These are official statistics in development, and we advise caution when using the data. The BICS questions and topics are regularly reviewed, and questions are often added, removed, or amended to reflect changing circumstances and analytical priorities.

2. Headline figures

The data presented in this bulletin are the final results from Wave 105 of the Business Insights and Conditions Survey (BICS), which was live from 18 March to 31 March 2024.

The data reported within BICS bulletins and datasets are estimates that are subject to <u>uncertainty</u>, for example, sampling variability and <u>non-sampling error</u>. Further information on quality is available in our <u>Business Insights</u> and <u>Conditions Survey Quality and Methodology Information (QMI)</u>, and we regularly update <u>confidence intervals</u> associated with the survey questions.

The percentage of businesses that reported they were trading in late March 2024 was 94%, with 85% fully trading, and 9% partially trading (for example, trading with reduced hours or staff numbers). Meanwhile, 4% of businesses reported "temporarily paused trading", and 2% reported "permanently ceased trading" as their business's trading status.

Access to microdata

You can access the microdata for Waves 1 to 104 of the Business Insights and Conditions Survey (BICS) through the Secure Research Service (SRS). The BICS microdata for each wave are released on a rolling basis in the week following the publication of each wave. The microdata are made confidential and do not disclose information on any specific business.

Only researchers accredited under the <u>Digital Economy Act</u>, as explained on the UK Statistics Authority website are able to access data in the SRS. You can apply for accreditation through the <u>Research Accreditation Service</u> (<u>RAS</u>). You need to have relevant academic or work experience and must successfully attend and complete the assessed Safe Researcher Training.

To conduct analysis with microdata from the SRS, a project application must be submitted to the <u>Research</u> <u>Accreditation Panel (RAP)</u>, as explained on the UK Statistics Authority website. To access the SRS, you must also work for an organisation with an Assured Organisational Connectivity agreement in place.

4. Glossary

Reporting unit

The reporting unit is the business unit to which questionnaires are sent. The response from the reporting unit can cover the enterprise as a whole, or parts of the enterprise identified by lists of local units.

5. Measuring the data

Coverage

The BICS sampling frame is based on the same industries as our Monthly Business Survey (MBS). The MBS covers the UK for production industries only, and Great Britain for construction, retail and services industries. The MBS is an important input to the output measure of gross domestic product (GDP), which includes monthly GDP.

For detailed information on the industries covered by the MBS and BICS, see our<u>GDP(o) data sources catalogue</u>. The following are some industries that are excluded from MBS and BICS:

- agriculture
- oil and gas extraction
- energy generation and supply
- public administration and defence
- public provision of education and health
- finance and insurance
