Quarterly suicide death registrations in England: 2001 to 2023 registrations and Quarter 1 (Jan to Mar) to Quarter 3 (July to Sept) 2024 provisional data

Provisional rate and number of suicide deaths registered in England per quarter. Includes 2001 to 2023 registrations and provisional data for Quarter 1 (Jan to Mar) to Quarter 3 (July to Sept) 2024. These are official statistics in development.

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1. Main points

- There were 1,449 suicides registered in Quarter 3 (July to Sept) 2024 in England, equivalent to a rate of 11.2 suicide deaths per 100,000 people, shown in provisional analysis; this rate was the highest seen in any previous Quarter 3, but slightly lower compared with Quarter 1 (Jan to Mar) 2024.
- In Quarter 3 2024, there were 16.9 suicide deaths per 100,000 males (1,064 deaths registered) and 5.8 suicide deaths per 100,000 females (385 deaths registered).
- The South East had the lowest suicide rate of any region of England (9.0 suicide deaths per 100,000), while the highest rate was in the North East (15.9 suicide deaths per 100,000).
- For suicides in England, the median registration delay decreased from 198 days in Quarter 3 2023 to 191 days in Quarter 3 2024.

Suicide rates are based on the year of death registration. Because of registration delays, 29.5% of deaths registered in 2024 had a date of death in the same year (1,260 of 4,269 deaths), 58.2% occurred in 2023 (2,483 of 4,269 deaths), and the remaining deaths occurred in 2022 or earlier (12.3%; 526 of 4,269 deaths).

3. Data sources and quality

Official statistics in development

These statistics are based on information from mortality statistics, derived from information provided when deaths are certified and registered. We are developing how we collect and produce the data to improve the quality of these statistics.

Once the developments are complete, we will review the statistics with the Statistics Head of Profession. We will decide whether the statistics are of sufficient quality and value to be published as official statistics, or whether further development is needed. Production may be stopped if they are not of sufficient quality or value. Users will be informed of the outcome and any changes.

Data source

Statistics on mortality come from the information provided when deaths are certified and registered. This release uses the accredited official statistics definition of suicide, which is consistently used by government departments, agencies, and the devolved administrations across the UK.

For deaths caused by suicide, around half of the deaths registered each year will have occurred in the previous year, or earlier, because of the length of time it takes to hold a coroner's inquest. Quarterly rates

Calculation of mortality rates for quarterly deaths requires adjustments to be made to annual population estimates, to calculate rates that are comparable with annual rates. Further information is in our accompanying Deaths caused by suicide by quarter in England dataset.
